Local National Cycle Network routes

If you're a cycle commuter, a leisure walker or a long-distance bike tourer – join the million-plus people that love using Sustrans' well-signed National Cycle Network every single day.

- Spanning the UK, the Network's 16,575 miles of walking and cycling routes include:
- scenic traffic-free paths
 - quiet roads and lanes
 - signed on-road routes
 - themed long-distance routes



Walking, wheeling and cycling in Portsmouth

Portsmouth is flat and ideally suited to cycling and walking. Everyday trips to the shops, and for education and work, are relatively short, often less than a mile or two. This makes most journeys easy to walk, or for slightly longer distances, easy to reach by bike.

We've created this map to help you find easy ways to travel using the city's main walking and cycling routes. These mainly low-traffic or traffic-free routes are useful for everyone on bikes, particularly families, people new to riding, and people who prefer to use quieter roads. To connect routes, you will sometimes need to travel on slightly busier roads.

The cycle routes are also ideal for walking, and you can use the map to plan your journey using Portsmouth's extensive network of footpaths, crossing points and subways.

Highway Code

Remember the Highway Code applies to people on bikes as well as other road users.

It is illegal to cycle on the pavement unless the signs say otherwise.

Remember that even on a shared path people walking have the right of way.

You must obey all traffic signs and signals.

You must display front and rear lights at night as well as a rear reflector.

A bell is useful.

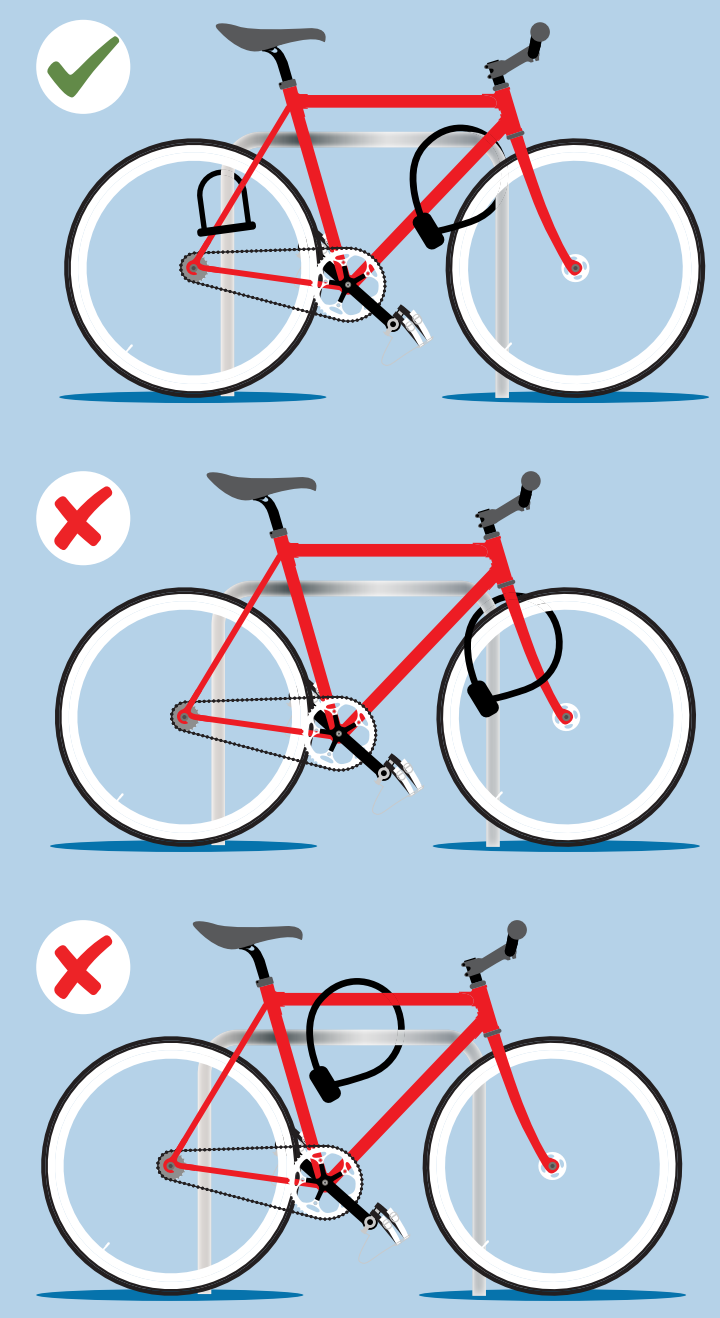


Road signs

- Route recommended for bikes
- Shared walking and cycle route - give way to people walking
- Segregated cycle and walking route - give way to people walking
- Two-way cycling in one-way road
- Bus, cycle and taxi lane ahead
- National Cycle Network route
- Warning - cycle lane ahead
- No cycling



How to lock your bike securely



It's always best to use two locks. Use different types, for example, a strong D-lock and a sturdy chain lock. A thief will need different tools to break each lock, making theft less likely.

- Lock both wheels and the frame to a bike stand or strong, immovable object
- Lock 'tight' so your bike is hard to manoeuvre when parked
- Secure your lock so it does not touch the ground

Buy a decent lock (or two). Before buying, check www.soldsecure.com to find out which locks are most secure. Expect to pay £40 upwards for a secure locking system.



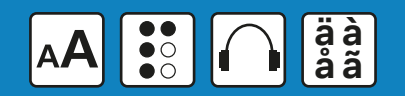
Polite cycling

If you ride a bike, give yourself a pat on the back for being green, healthy and reducing traffic congestion. But please make sure you stay off the pavement, follow traffic rules and use shared paths considerately. Not all people who cycle realise how much they can frighten people walking on the path, especially older people and people who are hard of hearing.

Show courtesy towards other people on the road or pavement - if we all look out for each other, we can keep travelling safely.

To get started, download the free Breeze app on Google Play or the App Store.

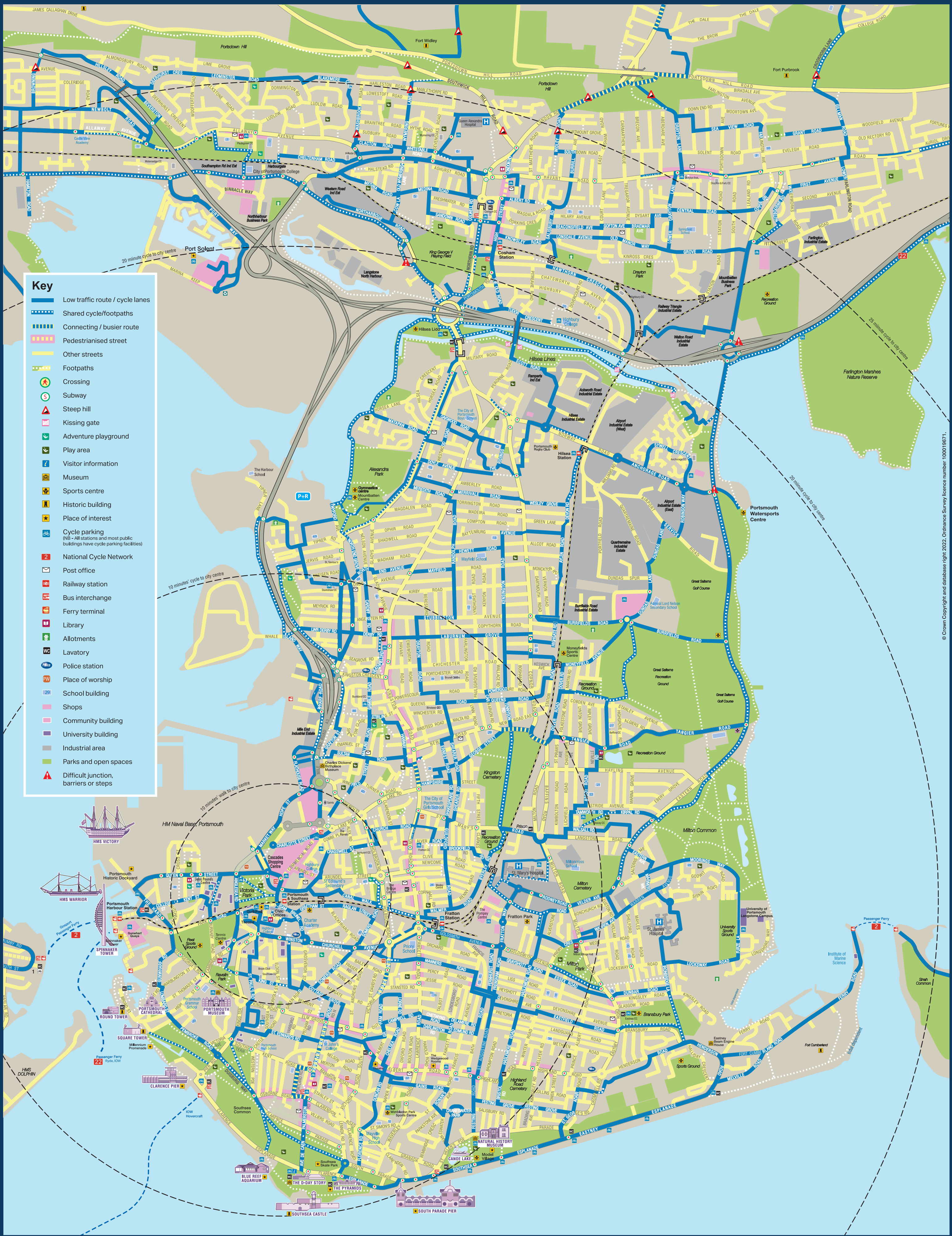

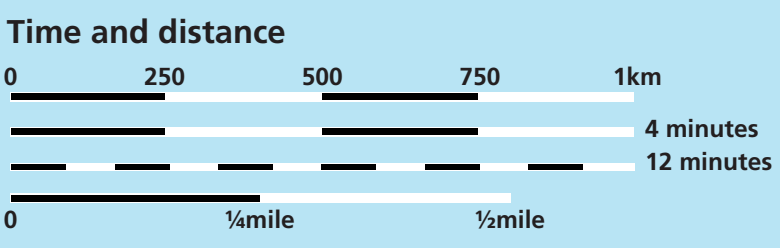
