




In June, Portsmouth is proud to be the home of the national UK Pride event and July will once again see the International Kite Festival return to the city.



The experience starts in the high-speed lift and in 30 seconds you step onto the viewing decks where Portsmouth, 'the great waterfront city' is showcased in all its glory.

These are unmissable sights, seen from a 350-degree panorama, and each with its own story. Discover the rich history behind the view with informative touch screen displays and take in the sea air from the open 'Sky Garden'.

For those brave enough, there's a thrilling 'Sky Walk' 100 metres above sea level or the opportunity to abseil down the Tower!

# THE D-DAY STORY

The D-Day Story is an essential part of any visit to Portsmouth. The Normandy landings remain the largest seaborne invasion ever seen, which marked the beginning of the end of the Second World War, and The D-Day Story is the only UK museum dedicated to the telling of this significant moment in history.

With the museum divided into three distinct parts, your visit begins on Landing Craft Tank 7074, the last surviving preserved LCT, which crossed the Channel during June 1944. Step onboard and discover its fascinating history from construction and its role during the Normandy campaign carrying up to ten tanks across the Channel, through to its post-war role as a floating nightclub! Sound effects, recreated crew quarters and Sherman and Churchill tanks bring the experience to life.







Inside the museum, discover how D-Day was planned and how those in charge took the critical decisions to make the operation a success. Audio visual displays and interactives put you in the shoes of those involved, whilst vehicles and objects provide a compelling insight into the personal stories of the individuals who were there.


The stunning 83 metre Overlord Embroidery completes the visit. Inspired by the Bayeux Tapestry and comprising 34 hand-stitched panels, the embroidery was created to commemorate those who took part on D-Day. You can also hear veterans' personal stories as they reflect on their wartime service. The museum is open from 10am to 5pm daily. **theddaystory.com** 

# SOUTHSEA CASTLE

Henry VIII's Southsea Castle is located a short walk from The D-Day Story. Built in 1544, the castle is reportedly from where Henry VIII watched the sinking of his favourite ship the Mary Rose. A buoy marks the wreck location and is viewable from the castle ramparts.

Visit the castle keep and discover more about the fortification's fascinating history, stop for a bite to eat at The Courtyard restaurant and climb the stone steps to walk around the ramparts to take in the expansive city and sea views.

The castle is fully open to visitors from April to October, while The Courtyard restaurant is open all year. southseacastle.co.uk

he beautiful seafront offers miles of beach and seafront promenade to explore, with the designated bathing area being to the east of South Parade Pier.

You are spoilt for choice with not one but two seafront piers. Clarence Pier to the west is home to a funfair, indoor Pitch and Putt, adventure Mini Golf, arcade games and much more. Further along the seafront to the east is the majestic South Parade Pier, home to arcade games, family activities and great food options – including fish and chips. Take a stroll onto the pier and enjoy the amazing views across the Solent to the Isle of Wight. The pier also comes to life in the evening with regular entertainment in The Gaiety.

Just across the road from here is Canoe Lake and **Portsmouth's Natural History Museum**. This small, free museum includes the A-Z of Natural History exhibition, plus geology and wildlife habitat displays, a working beehive and a seasonal butterfly house.

In the garden behind the museum you will find a wooden sculpture of a bumblebee forming part of a bench. This is one of five wildlife sculptures to discover in and around Canoe Lake.

Nearby, constructed on the site of the ancient Lumps Fort, is Southsea Model Village – a 1/12 scale miniature world including G scale railway featuring Thomas and friends.

If you are looking for great indoor play to keep the children active and entertained, **Exploria** at Portsmouth Pyramids Centre is ideal. Discover extreme fun across three connected worlds, with areas for juniors, toddlers and babies alike. Activities include a ninja run, slides, ball pit and Little Tykes' car track.

For something truly exhilarating try one of the Hovercraft Experience Flights, leaving from Southsea beach throughout the year.

For visitors with disabilities Wet Wheels Solent provides power boat experiences for all.

There is more of the natural world to discover at **Blue Reef Aquarium** situated between Clarence Pier and The D-Day Story. The Solent Seas, Tropical Treasures and Freshwater Fun displays have a range of animals to view, including axolotls, clown fish, eels, snapping turtles, seahorses, stingrays, porcupine pufferfish and red bellied piranha. There is also an outdoor splash pool play area for sunnier days.

With major coastal defence works taking place in 2025 a large section of the seafront road will be closed. The best parking for Blue Reef Aquarium is the D-Day car park which is just a few minutes' walk away. You can still easily access the area from the west by foot along an all-weather path on Southsea Common.



# WHAT'S ON IN 2025



Portsmouth has a packed calendar of year-round events. The city hosts everything from breathtaking theatre productions to huge music festivals, free family activities and loads more besides. For the most up-to-date listings of everything going on head to visitportsmouth.co.uk — or here are just some of the event highlights this year.

#### JANUARY - FEBRUARY

The year kicks off with a decidedly literary slant. We'll be marking the birth of Charles Dickens on 7 February at the home in which he was born – which is today a museum. Then it's the turn of **Portsmouth BookFest**, bringing a host of authors to locations across the city for talks, workshops and readings.

#### MARCH - APRIL

There will be some egg-cellent family activities at many Portsmouth attractions over the Easter holidays. You can egg-spect craft activities, trails, and plenty more besides. April also sees the return of the South's premier metal music event, **Takedown Festival** at Portsmouth Guildhall.

#### MAY - JUNE

The festivities continue in early May with Portsmouth Comic Con. The international festival of comics welcomes world famous actors, writers and cartoonists. Later, Portsmouth takes centre stage as the location of UK Pride 2025. A huge party is planned for the occasion. The city will also host a number of events to mark the 80th anniversary of VE Day in May.













#### JULY - AUGUST

Summer brings with it not one but two major sailing events, in the form of Sail GP and The Ocean Race – both of which will offer fantastic opportunities for spectators, as well as ways to get involved with the sport. There will also be the return of Portsmouth International Kite Festival on Southsea Common and classical music events on Guildhall Square. Plus, don't forget the incredible Victorious Festival over the August Bank Holiday weekend.

#### SEPTEMBER - OCTOBER

The summer may draw to a close but the events certainly do not. In September Look Up Portsmouth celebrates all things street art, where you can watch national and international artists create new works live. Or how about going behind the scenes for free tours as part of Heritage Open Days? There's also Games Fest at Portsmouth Guildhall and the hugely popular Great South Run – the world's premier 10-mile running event.

#### **NOVEMBER - DECEMBER**

As the year concludes, Portsmouth explodes into colour with firework displays and Christmas Light Switch On parties. The festivities continue with a whole host of pantomime performances at the city's numerous theatres, as well as many Christmas Markets for you to grab that perfect gift. You can also get your skates on as Portsmouth On Ice returns to Guildhall Square.

et ready for an amazing summer experience at Victorious Festival! Every August Bank Holiday, Southsea seafront comes alive with world-class music, stunning coastal views, and endless festival fun.

Head to the World Music Village for global rhythms or pull up a deck chair at the Seaside Stage. Don't miss the afternoon comedy sessions, where the UK's funniest comedians will have you laughing nonstop. Plus, afternoon special guest slots mean the party kicks off early each day.

The fun doesn't stop there – hit the Skatepark for roller discos and skate demos, and dance the night away at Henry's House, a party set inside historic Southsea Castle.

It's not just for the grown-ups – Victorious is packed with fun for the whole family! The Kids' Arena has free activities like retro gaming, bouncy castles, art walls, and face painting, plus a talent-packed Kids Stage.

Feeling hungry? There are hundreds of food traders ready to serve up festival feasts. And be sure to catch pop-up performances throughout the day or dive into literary fun at the Spoken Arts Parlour.

# COASTAL CULTURE

ortsmouth most certainly knows its arts from its elbow. The city is home to not one but two Matcham theatres, as well as the fantastic Guildhall, multiple art galleries and iconic music venues.

Theatregoers really are spoilt for choice in Portsmouth. There's the Kings
Theatre in Southsea (a 1,400-capacity room in a stunning Grade II-listed building) and the New Theatre Royal in the city centre (with 656 seats, as well as the Minghella Studio and Coffee Bar). Both were designed in part by the eminent architect Frank Matcham, whose name is synonymous with beautiful and functional theatres that are equally as stunning as anything you'll witness on stage.

Both venues welcome touring drama and comedy shows all year round, whilst also putting on events for the local community and working with regional theatre groups.

In 2025 the Kings Theatre's programme will include award-winning musical Bat Out of Hell, Strictly stars Dianne and Vito, and the return of Broadway smash hit Six.

Meanwhile, at the New Theatre Royal there's the chance to see renowned author Kate Mosse, TV funnyman Chris McCausland and everyone's favourite villain Craig Revel Horwood.

That's not all, as the smaller Groundlings Theatre hosts touring shows, amateur productions, live music and more inside its converted Georgian schoolhouse near Portsmouth Historic Dockyard and Gunwharf Quays.

The city's largest venue is **Portsmouth Guildhall** – which hosts the biggest names in music and comedy. In fact, it has welcomed luminaries such as The Beatles, Led Zeppelin, Jimi Hendrix, U2, Arctic Monkeys, Elton John and countless others over the years. It was also where Pink Floyd gave their seminal album Dark Side of the Moon its full live debut.

Over 2025 the Guildhall will host performances by Greg Davies, James Martin, Mo Gilligan, Anastacia and Riverdance, as well as a full programme of classical music and a host of smaller shows from up-and-coming acts in the Lens Studio.





not to mention bands that would go on to headline Victorious Festival – among them Kasabian, Biffy Clyro and Jamie T.

There are artists of a different kind frequenting Aspex – a contemporary art gallery located within the Gunwharf Quays complex. Here you can see work from the cutting edge of modern, boundary-pushing art – with many of those featured previously having since gone on to achieve great success.

As well as its creative programme of installations, the gallery also hosts regular events for families, craft workshops, and activities for those with dementia. Entry is free and there's also a popular café on site.

Just a short walk from Aspex you'll find the Hotwalls Studios. Built into centuriesold fortifications lining the seafront are 14 modern artist studios, where designer makers create and sell their wares, host workshops and take commissions. There's also a regular market where you can talk to the resident artists to find out more about their work. The line up of residents change as the artists find success and move to their own premises, but the current crop includes fine artists, ceramicists, potters, jewellers and even a taxidermist.

There are brand new galleries open at Portsmouth Museum and Art Gallery offering you the chance to see pieces from the extensive civic collection, as well as items on loan from national galleries. This free museum also includes a range of displays showcasing moments in Portsmouth's history.

rom shopping with small businesses to trying out experiences you cannot get anywhere else, there are huge rewards to be had for embracing indie Portsmouth. Thankfully, there's much to choose from in a city that's proud of its independent streak.

To begin, why not shop local? Not only will you help out a small business, it's also your opportunity to take home something not readily available on any copy-and-paste high street up and down the land. Whether it's clothing from Strong Island or some quality spirits from the Portsmouth Distillery, there's no shortage of places to pick up something unique.

In Southsea you're spoilt for choice. A walk along Castle Road, Marmion Road or Albert Road will bring you to independent bookshops, record stores, homeware manufacturers and plenty more besides.

Castle Road is a particular favourite, with many much-loved indie businesses packed into a relatively small area. There's Pie & Vinyl, serving up hot meals and the coolest new releases, Brocante, which specialises in quality antiques, and Artypotz, where you can design your own ceramics to take home. Food and drink is covered by (among others) bar/bistro Delaneys and beloved pub The Barley Mow.

A short walk will bring you to Marmion Road – where there are independent shops selling furniture, homewares, vintage clothing, gifts, cosmetics, jewellery and more. There's also the Southsea Local, offering food and drink from small, local manufacturers.

Over on Elm Grove you'll find the Southsea Deli where, as well as picking up food to take away, you can also attend masterclasses to learn how to make artisan bread, pies, street food and more. Then, just a little way along the road is the famed Bread Addiction – though it's worth getting there early as the much-loved sourdough loaves and sweet pastries often sell out.

For a real treat get yourself a bottle or two from the Portsmouth Distillery Co. Based out of an old fort, the distillery makes truly incredible rum and gin – and the wonderful surrounds are often used for music and comedy nights.

Craft beer lovers are well catered for with a selection of breweries to try out. Urban Island is located in Hilsea and serves a great selection of its own ales from a tap house at the top of Portsea Island. Or, near Fratton Park you'll find Staggeringly Good – its IPAs being particularly popular – whilst the Southsea Brewing Co that started out of Southsea Castle now has its own pub in Eastney.




The independent shopping continues at Portsmouth's many markets – find out more about these on page 27.

Slightly newer on the scene are MakeMake off the Eastern Road (bringing real ingenuity and originality to its brews), and Powder Monkey, based in Priddy's Hard over the water in Gosport.

Each of these offer the chance to drink in at the on-site taprooms, or you can take bottles, cans and mini kegs away to enjoy at home.

Wine more your thing? Wines By
The Sea has a great selection that you
won't find in the supermarket, as well as
expert information readily available for
you to find your next favourite. There's
also a top selection (including some real
left-field options) at Crushed & Cured.
If you've an hour to spend, drop in for a
cheese and wine flight, or pick up some
quality charcuterie. You may also be able
to book onto a tasting night, replete with
expert advice and insight.

t was within the city that **Charles Dickens**, perhaps the most celebrated
Victorian author, was born. The Dickens
family moved to Portsmouth for his father's
work in the Royal Navy, making a home
on what is now Old Commercial Road.
Today, this humble terraced house is a
museum to celebrate Dickens' life, being
decorated in the styles favoured at the
time and displaying some of his personal
possessions.

You can visit the museum on select open days throughout the year, or make a special journey for Dickens' birthday on 7 February, when it opens for free to all and has a small ceremony – often featuring some of his direct descendants.

Another literary icon to have come out of Portsmouth is Sherlock Holmes. Whilst

working as a doctor in the city, **Sir Arthur Conan Doyle** devised the character that would go on to become famous around the world. His 'consulting detective' may have an address on London's Baker Street, but he was made in Portsmouth.

This wasn't Doyle's only impression on the city, however. A keen sportsman, he also played in goal for Portsmouth AFC – making 76 appearances.

The author's links with the city are remembered at **Portsmouth Museum** and Art Gallery, in which some of the items from the world's largest collection of Conan Doyle memorabilia are displayed. These include various Holmes books and paraphernalia, as well as the personal artefacts of Doyle himself. The exhibition – like the museum itself – is free to visit.


Other eminent writers to have lived in Portsmouth at one point in their lives include **HG Wells** (who took a job as a draper's assistant but left for London citing the 'drudgery' of the job), and **Rudyard Kipling**, whose parents sent him to the UK from India for schooling. He lived in Southsea with his sister Trix for six years – at a home where a blue plaque now bears his name.

More recently Portsmouth has been home to **Michelle Magorian**, the writer behind Goodnight Mister Tom and Just Henry.

These literary connections are being celebrated keenly this year, with local arts and culture collective **Portsmouth Creates** designating 2025 as its Year of Literature and Literacy. There will be a host of events and celebrations, to not only honour the famed authors who have lived or worked in the city, but also boost literacy levels and foster the next generation of best-sellers.

This will be in addition to the regular **Portsmouth BookFest** event, which takes place every February and March. It welcomes renowned celebrities and writers to the city's libraries and other venues for talks, workshops and readings.


## PIECING TOGETHER THE PAST

From the arrival of iconic ships to turning points in global wars – and even a royal wedding – Portsmouth has seen it all. Ours may be a relatively small island, but it's rich in history.

Id Portsmouth is, as the name suggests, one of the city's oldest developed areas. However, even though it's home to some historic fortifications (among them the Round Tower which has stood in one form or another since 1418), the Old Portsmouth of today is also where you'll find popular pubs, well-rated restaurants and modern artist studios.

Standing tall over Old Portsmouth is the Cathedral of St Thomas – located on the site of the original chapel that was dedicated back in 1188. Formally a cathedral since 1927, it's now a popular spot not just for the regular services but also year-round events – everything from markets to live music performances and art exhibitions.

The nearby **Royal Garrison Church** is also rich in history, being the location of Charles II's marriage to Catherine of Braganza. Originally a hospice (back in 1212) the building has since been used as a church and armoury. What's most striking about the building is that it has no roof over the nave – a result of The Blitz – which makes it a popular subject for photographers.

All that exploring is sure to work up an appetite; thankfully there are some great pubs and restaurants on offer in Old Portsmouth. Near the area known as The Point you have the ever-popular triumvirate of the Still & West, Spice Island Inn and the Bridge Tavern, each located right along the water's edge and offering wonderful views of the local area. Plus on High Street you have The Dolphin – which is believed to be the city's oldest pub still in operation (established 1716) – with self-styled 'proper pub' The Pembroke just around the corner.

For restaurants, Abarbistro has won countless people over with its quality international menu, whilst back on High Street is Florio's Italian, as well as Smoke & Mirrors for modern fine dining. Alternatively, if you're in self-catering accommodation you may want to treat yourself to the freshest seafood to take away from Fish Portsmouth right on the Camber Docks.

Head north of the city and you'll find Fort Nelson. Located atop Portsdown Hill with stunning views of Portsmouth and the surrounding areas, this Victorian fort is now home to some prize items from the Royal Armouries' collection – including a 15th-century Turkish bombard cannon, a gigantic 200-tonne railway howitzer, and the infamous 'Big Babylon' Iraqi supergun.

In addition to the armoury collection, Fort Nelson also has tunnels, ramparts and a parade ground to explore, across a site measuring some 19 acres.

A short hop from Fort Nelson is the magnificent **Portchester Castle** – the best-preserved Norman Fort in northern Europe. Thought to have been built between AD 285 and AD 290, the castle has gone through many different uses. It was where medieval kings gathered their forces before crossing the Channel (the most famous being Henry V who, in 1415, launched the invasion of France that culminated in his triumph at Agincourt), was a prisoner of war camp as far back as 1665, and more recently was a pleasure garden. Today it's a popular tourist attraction managed by English Heritage.

Elsewhere in Portsmouth you can take in the elegant Boulton & Watt steam engines that brought sanitation to residents during the Victorian era at **Eastney**Engine Houses, or walk around the very home in which renowned author Charles Dickens was born.

All this heritage and that's even without **Portsmouth Historic Dockyard** – which is covered in detail on pages 6-7. And don't forget, you can get free entry into **Portsmouth Historic Quarter** at the dockyard – where you can explore the displays at Boathouse 4 (and take a harbour tour from the pontoon), step into the world of navy workers at The Dockyard Apprentice in Boathouse 7, or enjoy some downtime at Porter's Garden and Mast Pond. Simply ask for a Historic Quarter Pass at the dockyard ticket office.

You can take in all this history (and more) with a walk along the Millennium Promenade, which starts at Portsmouth Historic Dockyard and runs all the way to Southsea Castle. The route is clearly signposted, either by plaques along the route or through the chain link motif set into the pavement throughout Old Portsmouth.

Discover much more with the series of information boards lining the route, each giving an insight into the area, its buildings and the notable people who have left their mark. A guide to the Millennium Promenade is available from the Visitor Information Points, or digitally on the Visit Portsmouth website.



trip to the coast wouldn't be complete without getting some fresh sea air. On your next trip to Portsmouth, make sure you allow some time in your itinerary to explore the great outdoors.

What better place is there to start than at the seafront? With the Portsmouth section of **England's Coastal Path** now complete, you have plenty of choice (though please note that ongoing sea defence works may impact access to certain areas over the coming years).

The newly opened walkway along the seafront side of Blue Reef Aquarium and Southsea Castle is an ideal starting point. Here you can enjoy a scenic walk or rest for a while at the 'Theatre of the Sea' –

a vantage point at Portsea Island's most southerly point that's perfect for watching the comings and goings of the Solent.

From here, head eastwards past South Parade Pier and you'll reach the large and open beaches of Southsea and Eastney. With plenty of scope to spread out, this area always has space even during the busiest of summer days.

The coast at Portsea Island's eastern edge provides quieter walking routes. If you want to get away from some of the busier tourist spots, this is the place to go. It's also a must for wildlife spotters, with the adjoining Langstone Harbour and Farlington Marshes designated as Sites of Special Scientific Interest. Species to be seen here include avocets, redshanks,

dunlins, short-eared owls, redstarts, spotted flycatchers, wheatears, reed warblers, sedge warblers, lapwings and more.

Of course, though the coastline may be most people's first port of call for time spent outdoors, that's far from all there is to enjoy.

Portsmouth has plenty of green space. Most notable of them all is **Southsea Common**, taking up a huge area right along Southsea seafront from Clarence Pier to the Pyramids Centre. The open grassland covers around 75 acres and is a popular space for playing ball games and flying kites, or for dining al fresco in the designated barbecue areas. Visitors bringing their dogs will also find plenty of space for off-lead walks.




hard courts on a pay-and-play basis). Youngsters will be well catered for, with Southsea Splash Pool nearby and a large play park near the Hovertravel terminal.

Another popular green space is the area around Canoe Lake, which also has tennis courts open to the public, not to mention the beautiful Rose Gardens, peaceful Japanese Garden, two cafés, splash park, play park and Model Village.

Over at the city centre you'll find Victoria Park, which has been at the heart of Portsmouth for more than 140 years. It contains nine monuments, a historic fountain, an aviary for birds and mammals, a relaxing café and an accessible play park.

It's a more rugged affair at Milton Common - a mixture of natural grassland, scrub and ponds. Take a walk along the network of paths crisscrossing the common, passing the three lakes that provide a home for insects, mammals and birds. Depending on the time of year you could see swallows, swifts, house martins, moorhen, tufted ducks, foxes, owls and kestrels.

# SPORT BY THE SEA Port both

Portsmouth has a proud sporting heritage – both on land and sea – making it the perfect place to stay active, try a new activity or simply enjoy watching one of the city's larger sporting events taking place right across the year.



n 2025 Portsmouth will proudly host two major sailing events – Sail GP in July and The Ocean Race in August.

Along with Pretty Muddy and Race for Life in July, the major running event in the calendar is the Great South Run in October – known as one of the world's best ten-mile races. We can't forget football and Fratton Park, of course. Why not catch a Pompey men's or women's home game during your visit to the city?

As the UK's only island city, Portsmouth has a wide range of water-based activities on offer and has three marinas: Gunwharf Quays, Port Solent and Southsea Marina.

The Andrew Simpson Centre is the first port of call for any enthusiast, with courses and access to water-based activities including sailing, rowing, powerboating, kayaking, canoeing and paddle-boarding. The centre also houses a 13 metre outdoor climbing tower; one for the brave!

Or try out wakeboarding at the South Coast Wakepark, equipped with a premier cable wake system and offering a wide range of equipment and hire gear suitable for all abilities, from beginners to experienced wakeboarders.

For runners the seafront in Southsea is perfect, with amazing views across the Solent to the Isle of Wight. If you prefer to run with company, join one of the regular organised weekend runs that take place across the city. The seafront is also home to adventure mini golf, pitch 'n' putt, play parks and beach volleyball courts to keep you entertained.









indoor and six outdoor courts. The city also has the Tennis Academy in Burnaby Road, Southsea Tennis Club on the seafront and Court X at Canoe Lake, with a tennis pavilion, four topspecification artificial grass courts and newly refurbished grass and hard courts.

The University of Portsmouth's Ravelin Park Sports Centre includes an eight-court sports hall, eight-lane 25 metre swimming pool, 175-station fitness suite, multipurpose studios, squash courts, a climbing and bouldering wall, and a ski simulator. One of the UK's most sustainable sports centres, Ravelin Park has pay-as-you-go options for city visitors.

In the north of the city Hilsea Lido is undergoing a major renovation project and is set to open in 2025 in line with its 90th anniversary, offering outdoor swimming. Check for opening updates on visitportsmouth.co.uk

On Portsdown Hill are the **Peter Ashley Activity Centres**, located in the historic environments of Fort Purbrook and Fort Widley. Activities to pre-book include horse riding, archery, bushcraft, mountain biking, climbing, orienteering, rifle shooting and laser tag. Book a family adventure day and learn a new skill.

Portsmouth has not one but two 18-hole golf courses – **Portsmouth Golf Centre** and **Portsmouth Golf Course**. Both are available for pay and play, offering outstanding views and affordable sessions on great courses.

The iconic **Southsea Skatepark** is home to international-standard ramps, or check out Pitt Street, an undercover skatepark in the city centre. In winter you can venture onto the ice at the seasonal city ice rink in front of the majestic Portsmouth Guildhall.

#### **Sport Centres**

BH Live Active offers two facilities in Portsmouth. The Pyramids has high-quality fitness facilities including a cardio zone, free weights, functional fitness, group cycle and PULSE studios. Fitness classes include Les Mills, yoga, group cycling, and much more. These are available to members and on a pay-as-you-go basis.

The Mountbatten Centre in the north of the city is home to an Olympic-sized pool, teaching pool, spa, 150-station state-of-the-art gym, health suite, eight-court sports hall, squash courts, athletics and cycle tracks, and a great programme of activities and events.

Next door to the Mountbatten Centre is Portsmouth Tennis Centre with four



### Day 2 – History and heritage

There's a full day of exploring to enjoy, and you're going to need it!
Today it's the turn of Portsmouth Historic
Dockyard, where a whole host of world-class attractions await.

There are few better places to explore Portsmouth's long and storied past than at the Historic Dockyard. Grab an Ultimate Explorer ticket for entry to all attractions – which also lets you return for unlimited visits for a whole year. Climb on board the stunning HMS Warrior (a warship so powerful it was said to have made all others obsolete on the day it launched); view Henry VIII's beloved Mary Rose and the artefacts that lay on the seabed for over 400 years; and see the awe-inspiring work that is going into maintaining HMS Victory for many more years to come.

You may also be able to catch a glimpse of the Royal Navy's current crop of vessels on a harbour tour – also included with your Ultimate Explorer ticket.

Once you've finished at the dockyard (or, more likely, left things to catch on a future visit), head across to Southsea where there's even more to discover.

The D-Day Story is the UK's only museum dedicated solely to the Normandy landings of 1944. Using personal testimonies from those involved in the operation, it tells individual stories of

what happened on the momentous day of 6 June that helped turn the tide of the Second World War. Artefacts on display range from the tiny (a pencil that signed off the invasion) to the huge (LCT 7074, a surviving Landing Craft from D-Day).

A literal stone's throw from The D-Day Story is Southsea Castle, a historic fortification at Portsea Island's most southerly tip. The castle was reportedly built with guidance from Henry VIII himself, and the infamous king was present during the Battle of the Solent to see the Mary Rose sink to the bottom of the sea. Today the castle is a visitor attraction offering a museum in the keep, as well as a restaurant (The Courtyard), gift shop and wonderful views from the ramparts.

All that exploring is sure to have worked up an appetite. A short walk through Southsea Common will bring you to a host of independent pubs, bars and restaurants, so you'll certainly find something that appeals. Stay the night enjoying some local hospitality, or head to one of the city's famed venues for a live show – whether that's touring productions at the New Theatre Royal and Kings Theatre, big-name acts at Portsmouth Guildhall or the best up-and-coming bands at the Wedgewood Rooms.

### Day 3 – Seafronts and send-offs

Before setting off why not get a last bit of fresh sea air? At Old Portsmouth you can soak up some sun at the Hotwalls beach then enjoy coastal views from atop centuries old fortifications (following the Millennium Promenade trail, with its information panels detailing the area's fascinating history). Along Southsea seafront, meanwhile, there are equally stunning views to admire from the 'Theatre of the Sea' built into the new coastal defences, and the chance to visit not one but two piers.

Southsea Common is adjacent to the seafront; this vast expanse of open green space provides an ideal location for a run around, some ball games or a lovely picnic – all to set you up for the journey home when you can start planning your next trip to Portsmouth!

### **Driving**

Portsmouth enjoys good road connections; the A3(M) puts London just over an hour away and the M275 links Portsmouth to the rest of Britain's motorway network. Portsmouth's Park and Ride is accessed direct from the M275 as you drive into the city and offers a quick and affordable way to visit. parkandride.portsmouth.gov.uk

### Rail

Travelling to Portsmouth by train is a great option with regular direct services to London (from 92 mins with South Western Railway), the south coast and the rest of the UK. Book in advance and take advantage of regular special offers.

#### Air

Southampton International Airport (southamptonairport.com) is just 22 miles away and the major London airports Gatwick and Heathrow are both 60 miles away with easy rail access to the city.

### **Local ferries**

Travelling to and from the Isle of Wight couldn't be easier. Hovertravel operates a passenger hovercraft from Southsea to Ryde and Wightlink operates a car ferry service from Portsmouth to Fishbourne and a passenger catamaran service from Portsmouth Harbour to Ryde Pier. Passenger ferries also run across Portsmouth's two harbours to Gosport and Hayling Island.



### **Portsmouth International Port**

With its dramatic harbour, Portsmouth International Port creates a spectacular arrival and departure for passengers.

It offers a range of routes to Europe and a growing cruise offer, making it ideally located for both short breaks and international travel.

Regular Brittany Ferry services sail to Caen, Cherbourg and Le Havre in Normandy, and St Malo in Brittany, plus Spanish destinations Santander and Bilbao. There are also frequent ferry sailings to Jersey and Guernsey.

Major operators and cruise lines have chosen Portsmouth for its superb position and impressive facilities, offering customers inspiring destinations aboard beautiful luxury liners.

The port also boasts one of the most environmentally advanced terminal buildings in the UK, and sustainability is central to future plans.

At the port you're never far from the city's main attractions, which makes it ideally suited for extending your holiday, giving you the perfect opportunity to stay a while and explore.

### Walking, cycling and bus

The city's buses are a great way to get around once you have arrived. Portsmouth is also flat and compact, making walking and cycling convenient modes of transport. Portsmouth is also the ideal location to explore the area by train. Take a day trip to **London** – just over 90 minutes away – and visit some of the capital's top attractions.


