A short walk takes you to
Portsmouth Historic Dockyard, home
to the finest maritime heritage in the
world, including the historic ships
HMS Victory, Mary Rose and
HMS Warrior along with the National
Museum of the Royal Navy, boat
tours around Portsmouth Harbour

and much more. The UK's only island city is rightly proud of its naval connections and is the base for the two newest Navy aircraft carriers, HMS Queen Elizabeth and HMS Prince of Wales – if you are lucky you may time your visit when one of these giant ships is arriving into or leaving port.

Portsmouth has great literary links. Discover more about the city's Sherlock Holmes connection at Portsmouth Museum and Art Gallery and visit the birthplace of the great author, Charles Dickens.

Stroll through the cobbled streets of Old Portsmouth and take a walk along the historic fortifications and new sea defences*.

From Old Portsmouth you can continue along the waterfront to Southsea, home to Henry VIII's castle and The D-Day Story museum.

Portsmouth is a year-round destination with a changing offer throughout the seasons. The packed events programme ensures there is always something extra to add in to any stay with plenty to choose from in the evenings as well as the day.

^{*} The Southsea Coastal Scheme is the UK's largest local authority-led coastal defences project, worth more than £130M. When finished the new defences will stretch for around 3 miles from Old Portsmouth to Eastney, and help to reduce the risk of flooding to more than 10,000 homes and 700 businesses.

CITY BREAK

Only have a weekend to take in all the great things to see and do at the Great Waterfront City? Fear not, as our handy guide will guarantee you get the most out of three days in Portsmouth.



egin your trip with a visit to the Spinnaker Tower.

Not only is the attraction a true emblem of modern

Portsmouth, it also provides the ideal vantage point to see everywhere you'll be going over the days ahead.

From its viewing decks 100 metres above sea level you can take in the Portsmouth cityscape, look across

to the South Downs, and see out to


the Solent and the Isle of Wight. On a good day you can see for up to 23 miles across city, coast and country.

Once you've soaked up the view, head back down to earth and enjoy all there is to see and do at Gunwharf Quays. The waterfront outlet centre is home to more than 90 designer retail outlets, making it a must-visit destination for shopaholics looking to grab a bargain. As well as the shops

you'll also find 30 bars, restaurants and coffee shops, not to mention a bowling alley, multiplex cinema, contemporary art gallery, Miniport, and plenty more besides – so you don't need to go far for that evening's food and entertainment either.

Alternatively, head over to the city centre, where you'll find a host of bigname shops, bars and cafés, as well as the indoor shopping centre Cascades.







The next day it's off to Portsmouth Historic Dockyard. Here you'll find icons of British Naval history from across the centuries – all of which can be accessed with one Ultimate Explorer ticket. Go on board Nelson's HMS Victory and see up-close the work being done to preserve her for future generations to enjoy. Then, take a tour of HMS Warrior – once the world's fastest and most feared ship that was said to have made all other warships redundant the day she was launched (but never actually fired a shot in anger).

You can also visit the Mary Rose – flagship of Henry VIII's fleet and subject of an enormous marine salvage operation beamed live around the world. The restored hull now sits on display alongside the enormous cache of Tudor artefacts that were also brought back to the surface after over 437 years on the seabed.

Don't forget to head out on a harbour tour as well, to see the

current crop of naval vessels from around the world in Portsmouth Harbour during your visit.

After all that exploring, why not settle into a show at one of the city's magnificent theatres? Both the New Theatre Royal and Kings Theatre were designed by eminent architect Frank Matcham – meaning the surrounds can be just as aweinspiring as what's taking place on the stage.

And that's not all. We also have Portsmouth Guildhall, which welcomes some of the biggest names in music, comedy and dance, with a varied programme across its many rooms and spaces. There's also the iconic Wedgewood Rooms, where a whole host of future stars have cut their teeth before making the big time.

Treat yourself to a slap-up meal before the show of your choice, with all the above venues benefitting from top quality restaurants, pubs and bars within a short walk.



Start your final day with a bracing stroll along Southsea Seafront. The fresh sea air and ever-changing coastal views are a year-round treat, and are the best way to work up an appetite for brunch at one of the many great eateries situated right along the seafront.

Once you've had your fill it's time to take in some of the other top sights located at the coast. Pop into Southsea Castle, the historic fortification from which Henry VIII watched the Battle of the Solent and the sinking of the Mary Rose. Then, head over to The D-Day Story, to hear the personal testimonies of those involved in the Normandy Campaign of World War II. You can also step on board the breath-taking LCT 7074 the 59-metre-long Landing Craft Tank that transported troops and tanks across the channel - and is the only surviving craft of its kind from the war.

With that done, all that's left is to plan your journey home – and also your next visit to Portsmouth, to explore everything else the UK's only island city has to offer.

Dockyard is the UK's premier
destination for naval history,
with unique pieces from
tiny coins to huge Georgian ships,
and wrecks spectacularly recovered
from the seabed. Experience Horatio
Nelson's flagship HMS Victory,
Henry VIII's favourite ship the Mary
Rose, the world's first iron-hulled
warship HMS Warrior, and even
more. See a genuine First World War
monitor ship, HMS M.33, and see
through the eyes of the workers at the
Dockyard Apprentice exhibit.

The brand-new experience Victory Live: The Big Repair presents visitors with an unprecedented look behind the scenes at the work needed to repair a First Rate line-of-battle ship. Rotting planking will be removed from the hull and replaced with new oak; repairs made to the ship's structural framework; and she will be fully re-rigged, in a process lasting ten to fifteen years and costing £35million. Best of all visitors will be there every step of the way – seeing the work going on up close using special viewing areas constructed around the ship.

A new 4D immersive theatre experience, '1982 – Dive the Mary Rose', will open in spring 2023 to showcase the untold story of the finding, excavation, and recovery of the Mary Rose. Unseen footage will be brought to life through the smells, sounds and movement from the raising, with 3D glasses and CGI used to optimise the experience.

Visitors looking for something to get the pulse racing can put their speed and agility to the test at the newly reopened, fun-packed Action Stations. Take on the Commando Experience and get a game face on to experience training with the Royal Marines.

Also included in the Ultimate Explorer ticket are the two Gosport


museums, Explosion! Museum of Naval Firepower, and the Royal Navy Submarine Museum. Investigate the only surviving British submarine from the Second World War and get up close to the powerful vessels of the clandestine Coastal Forces.

There's a ticket to suit everyone, with the very best value for money being the Ultimate Explorer, giving entry to all the attractions, including the Harbour tour, which provides unrivalled views of Britain's modern navy.

ortsmouth's history stretches back centuries – encompassing kings and queens, legendary naval battles, and a whole host of world-renowned authors. There really is history to explore around every corner.

The ideal place to start is Portsmouth Museum and Art Gallery, which tells the stories of the city and its inhabitants. See items from the world's largest collection of memorabilia relating to Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, who wrote the first two Sherlock Holmes novels in Southsea.

You'll also find paintings, ceramics and sculptures from the museum's own collection as well as loans from both national and international institutions.







There's more history on show at the Eastney Engine Houses, where the grand Boulton & Watt steam engines that brought effective drainage and sanitation to Victorian Portsmouth are on display.

Head north and you'll find
Fort Nelson - one of the many
fortifications installed in and around
Portsmouth by Lord Palmerston to
protect the city (and wider country)
from invasion. This former garrison
and military prison now houses the
big guns from the Royal Armouries'
collection. So not only can you enjoy
magnificent views out across the city
from its hilltop location, you may also
see a live firing too!

Back down at sea level is the impressive Portchester Castle which dates back to the 3rd century. The outer walls are the most complete Roman fortification north of the Alps, whilst inside you'll find a Norman Castle and well-tended grounds that are perfect for exploring or enjoying a summer picnic.

historic, but a visit today uses some of the latest modern technology to bring the cathedral's stories to life.

A short walk along High Street brings you to the Hotwalls Studios, where artists and designers ply their trades in converted arches built into Old Portsmouth's fortifications. Browse and buy unique pieces across a whole range of mediums, from painting to sculpture, jewellery and textiles. You can also attend workshops and Open Studios events, to see the magic happen right in front of your eyes – or even have a try yourself.

The Hotwalls Beach is also a popular haunt; the enclosed area making it not just a wonderful sun trap, but also an ideal point from which to view the comings and goings of Portsmouth Harbour up-close.

Old Portsmouth's fortifications are well worth a visit, with the ramparts offering incredible views out over the city and across the Solent. You can stop off at the Round Tower, a Grade I-listed fort originally built in wood around 1418 before being

replaced with the stone you see today in the 1490s.

If all that has worked up an appetite, you won't have to go far to get your fill of quality food and drink. Not only are some of Old Portsmouth's pubs the city's most historic, they're also some of the best-loved.

The Dolphin - located opposite
Portsmouth Cathedral - purports to be
the city's oldest pub still in operation,
having been established back in 1716.
Alternatively, head up to the Camber
where you can enjoy hearty pub grub
and some great local ales at the Still &
West, Spice Island Inn or The Bridge
Tavern - all of which are situated right
at the water's edge.

If all this coastal living has you fancying some seafood, you have plenty of choice. At Fish Portsmouth you can pick up the best catches - with an enormous selection to choose from, freshly landed that morning. Or, if you'd rather have someone else do the work for you, pop across the road to Abarbistro, where quality seafood is available alongside bistro classics (and some excellent wines too).

EXPLORE SPICE ISLAND

he historic quarter of Old
Portsmouth is a must-visit.
You can escape through
lamplit cobbled streets,
explore some of the best pubs in
Hampshire, and see creatives at
work in their artists' studios.

Today, Old Portsmouth is one of the city's most desirable locations – a long way removed from centuries ago, when it was notoriously known as 'Spice Island'. Back then it welcomed some of the area's less salubrious characters and saw



unsuspecting drinkers press-ganged into going on the next naval journey.

Of course, you're now much more likely to find top quality seafood or enjoy wonderful coastal views than bump into any ne'er-do-wells.

Start your visit at the magnificent Portsmouth Cathedral. The church of St Thomas dates back to 1182 and has become known as 'the cathedral of the sea', not only through its proximity to the coast but also its numerous memorials to sailors and seafarers. The building may be

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CULTURE

Culture buffs rejoice, there's a whole host of great things to see and do on your next visit to Portsmouth – from art galleries to museums, theatres, festivals, and plenty more besides.





o begin, why not take a tour of Portsmouth's literary past?
Some of the world's most famous authors have called
Portsmouth home at some point in their lives – and left their own indelible mark upon the city.

The most famous is Charles Dickens, who was born in a humble terraced house on what is now Old Commercial Road. The home has been transformed into a museum, containing many of Dickens' personal possessions.

Portsmouth is also home to the world's largest collection of memorabilia relating to Sir Arthur Conan Doyle - the man behind world-renowned 'consulting detective' Sherlock Holmes. A host of fascinating items from the collection are on display at Portsmouth Museum and Art Gallery - itself just a few minutes' walk from the place where Doyle first came up with the idea for his most enduring character.

Other famed writers with a link to the city include HG Wells, Rudyard Kipling and Michelle Magorian.

Portsmouth's literary links are celebrated every year at BookFest, where visitors can enjoy lively talks, workshops and readings from some well-known guest speakers.

The storytelling tradition is very much alive and well at the city's theatres - where you can see touring shows straight from the West End, as



well as some of the biggest names in music and comedy. The Kings Theatre in Southsea and New Theatre Royal in the city centre regularly welcome household names, whilst the smaller Groudlings Theatre – situated within a magnificent Georgian building – features community productions and stars of the future.

Portsmouth Guildhall is the city's largest venue – welcoming huge stars on their national and international tours. It was even where Pink Floyd gave the debut live airing to their seminal album The Dark Side of the Moon. More recently the building's main auditorium has been supplemented by the Guildhall Studio and The Box, to provide even more venue space for all sizes of act – meaning you have an even greater chance of finding something you like on your next visit.

If you'd rather sit back and enjoy something on the silver screen,







there's plenty of choice – and not just in terms of the film you want to watch. In addition to the bigname multiplexes, Portsmouth has the independent No. 6 Cinema (at Portsmouth Historic Dockyard) and Southsea Cinema (on Palmerston Road). Here you'll find some of the latest indie releases, as well as screenings of classics from yesteryear.

There's art of a different kind to enjoy at Aspex Portsmouth. The contemporary art gallery, located within the Gunwharf Quays complex, hosts an ever-changing programme of displays that enlighten, engage and enrich. You may also see some big names there, as those who were championed by the gallery in their formative years come back to repay the fayour.

As well as all the cultural attractions listed above there are a great many festivals, pop-ups and one-off events taking place all year round. There's Victorious Festival, which brings some of the biggest names in music to Southsea Common every summer, and PortsFest (formerly Portsmouth Festivities), where live music, talks and workshops combine for a celebration of all things cultural.

Be sure to follow Portsmouth Creates, the organisation that is behind the We Shine Portsmouth light festival, as well as many other craft markets and other ventures taking place right across the city.

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

GREATOUTDOORS

2023 is the Year of the Coast, so what better way to mark the occasion than to head outside for the enormous variety of sights and sounds to enjoy at the seaside?

ortsmouth's position as an island city has inextricably linked it to the coast. The city has sea air built into its very DNA, and much of what there is to enjoy outdoors here can be found right along the water's edge.

To begin, how about a promenade along Southsea seafront? For miles on end you can enjoy sea views to one side and open parkland to the other as you take the flat path from Old Portsmouth to Eastney.

In fact, if you wanted to stretch this to its extreme you could take a walk around the perimeter of Portsea Island (along pathways that stretch for around 15.5 miles, if you were wondering) and never be more than half a mile from the coast - and often right alongside it.

The Portsmouth section of England's Coastal Path has now been finished, with the Calshot to Gosport and Gosport to Portsmouth sections (totalling some 52 miles, or 84km) having officially opened in 2022. As the National Trails agency itself says, the walk provides huge variety even just in Portsmouth alone, passing through residential, retail, recreational and industrial areas -

as well as Sites of Scientific Special Interest (SSSI).

In addition to this exciting new development we have all the great outdoor areas that have brought visitors back time and again for years.

Southsea Common is the huge expanse of open parkland located right along the coast. Here you can enjoy summer picnics or winter walks, or even treat yourself to a BBQ (in the designated areas).

The area is great for ball games, whether you want an impromptu kickabout with friends or prefer to visit the tennis and beach volleyball courts. The area is also home to Southsea Skatepark, which welcomes visitors on a pay-as-you-go basis, and hosts Roller Discos during summer which are always great fun.

Alternatively, head over to Milton Locks and Common for a more

relaxed affair. Here you can explore the many walkways and paths around the city's eastern edge, then go wildlife spotting in the calm, shallow waters (with animals here including starlings, house sparrows, copper butterflies, oystercatchers and sea purslane).

Finally, head off the island to Portsdown Hill for a breath-taking view looking out over Portsmouth and the surrounding areas.

Plans are taking shape to create a new urban Linear Park, stretching right across the very top of Portsea Island connecting the west of the city to the eastern edge. As well as providing enhanced cycling and walking facilities, the heart of the development will feature the Hilsea Leisure Park, a highquality destination including children's dry and wet play; water activities (such as wakeboarding); high quality food and drink; interaction with the natural and heritage environment through viewing platforms; and a crucial redevelopment of the much-loved Hilsea Lido as a cornerstone attraction.

Sport Centres

The University of Portsmouth's brand-new Ravelin Park Sports Centre includes an eight court sports hall, eight lane 25m swimming pool, 175 station fitness suite, multipurpose studios, squash courts, a climbing and bouldering wall rising from the basement through the building and a ski simulator. One of the UK's most sustainable sports centres, Ravelin Park has pay-as-yougo options for city visitors.

Another new offer - BH Live Active at Pyramids - is a brand-new state of the art accessible gym in Southsea. Motivating instructors are on hand to encourage and inspire with a full programme of energising classes including BodyPump, yoga, Pilates, group cycling, HIIT (High Intensity Interval Training) and more.

Portsmouth's Mountbatten Centre is home to an Olympic-sized pool, teaching pool, 150 station gym, health suite, eight court sports hall, squash courts, athletics and cycle tracks, and a great programme of activities and events. Next door is Portsmouth Tennis Centre with four indoor and six outdoor courts.

CourtX tennis, in Southsea, boasts a pavilion, four top-specification artificial grass courts along with newly refurbished grass and hard courts.

The Peter Ashley Activity Centres are located in the historic environments of Fort Purbrook and Fort Widley on Portsdown Hill. Activities to pre-book include horse riding, archery, bush craft, mountain biking, climbing wall, orienteering, rifle shooting and laser tag. Book a family adventure day and learn a new skill.

Portsmouth boasts two 18-hole golf courses - Portsmouth Golf Centre and Portsmouth Golf Course. Both are available for pay and play, offering outstanding views and affordable sessions on great courses.

The promenade along Southsea seafront is ideal for in-line and roller skating, whatever your age. It's also worth zipping down to Southsea Skatepark on the seafront, which is home to international-standard ramps, or check out the new Undercover Skatepark in the city centre - ideal on less clement days. In winter enjoy skating on real ice in front of Portsmouth Guildhall.

When the weather's good you can't beat Southsea's seafront. It offers miles of pebble beaches to explore and gigantic green spaces where you can let off some steam and enjoy the sea air. There are also tennis courts, adventure mini golf, a pitch 'n' putt green, play parks and beach volleyball courts to keep you entertained.

ortsmouth is a city with a proud sporting heritage, world-class facilities and a calendar of international events - be it road running at the Great South Run, sailing and kitesurfing on the water, or home matches at Portsmouth Football Club.

As the UK's only island city, Portsmouth is a prime destination for water sports of all kinds and boasts three marinas; Gunwharf Quays, Port Solent and Southsea Marina.

The Andrew Simpson Watersports Centre is the first port of call for any enthusiast, with courses and access

to water-based activities including sailing, rowing, powerboating, kayaking, canoeing and paddleboarding. The centre also houses a 13-metre outdoor climbing tower; one for the brave!

Or try out wakeboarding at the South Coast Wakepark, equipped with a premier cable wake system and offering a wide range of equipment and hire gear suitable for all abilities from beginners to experienced wakeboarders.

The Great South Run is a major highlight of the Portsmouth sporting calendar and is recognised as the

world's leading 10 mile running event. This fast, flat course is ideal for setting PBs, whilst also taking in some of the city's best scenery - from the beautiful seafront to Nelson's iconic HMS Victory.

With miles of beautiful seafront promenade, Southsea is a runner's paradise, where you can train with a sea-breeze on your back and everchanging views across the Solent towards the Isle of Wight and Hayling Island. If you prefer to run with company, join one of the regular organised weekend runs that take place across the city.

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TRAVEL INFORMATION

With a motorway into the heart of the city, an international port, a rail network direct to London in just over 90 minutes and international airports close by, access to Portsmouth couldn't be easier, whether you are coming to the city from within the UK or overseas.



Driving

Portsmouth enjoys good road connections; the A3(M) puts London just over an hour away and the M275 links Portsmouth to the rest of Britain's motorway network.

Portsmouth's Park and Ride is accessed direct from the M275 as you drive into the city and offers visitors a quick, easy and affordable way to visit: parkandride.portsmouth.gov.uk

Rail

Travelling to Portsmouth by train is a great option with regular direct services to London (from 92 mins with South Western Railway), the south coast and the rest of the UK. Book in advance and take advantage of regular special offers.

Aiı

Portsmouth is accessible by air. Southampton International Airport (southamptonairport.com) is just 22 miles away and the major London airports Gatwick and Heathrow are both 60 miles away with easy rail access to the city.

Isle of Wight

Travelling to and from the Isle of Wight couldn't be easier. Hovertravel operates a passenger hovercraft from Southsea to Ryde, the world's only year-round hovercraft service. Wightlink operates both a car ferry service from Portsmouth to Fishbourne and a foot passenger catamaran service from Portsmouth Harbour to Ryde Pier.







outhsea sits perfectly at the bottom of the island of Portsea and encompasses miles of beach, wide open green spaces, myriad attractions, museums, activities, shopping and food and drink - the perfect place to include on any visit to the great waterfront city. This is also where most of the larger city events take place on the vast green open spaces, with free music every weekend throughout the summer and the enormous Victorious Festival over the changing seascape of yachts, ferries, August bank holiday. In late summer and autumn events take a more sporting theme with kite surfing and the Great South Run - one of the best 10-mile races in the world.

As if this wasn't enough, Southsea seafront is getting a much-deserved facelift in the form of a multimillionpound project to create sea defences to protect the city while preserving its unique heritage. The work on these essential defences also offers the chance to make improvements to much of the seafront, so it is an even better place to walk, cycle, skate or run - or to just sit with fish and chips and watch the world go by! There is plenty to watch as well, with an everhovercraft, cruise ships, cargo ships and naval warships - including, if you are lucky, a glimpse of one of the two Royal Navy Queen Elizabeth-class aircraft carriers based in Portsmouth

The D-Day Story

The D-Day Story is a must see during any visit. The story of this momentous moment in World War Two is told in three distinct parts.

The visit starts on-board the enormous LCT 7074, the last surviving Landing Craft Tank that took part in the D-Day landings. For months the ship carried troops, supplies and up to ten tanks across the channel. It played a vital role in helping liberate Europe.

Following a multi-million-pound restoration project by the National Museum of the Royal Navy and funding from the National Lottery Heritage Fund, LCT 7074 has been restored to its former glory.

Sound effects, recreated crew quarters, and Sherman and Churchill tanks bring the experience of being on board to life.

The second part of the visit is inside the museum itself. Here, you find out about the planning of D-Day and how those in charge made crucial preparation decisions on when and where to cross the channel. Next is 'D-Day Landings and the Battle of Normandy'. The audio-visual displays show what it was like to be on a landing craft and give a compelling insight into the thoughts and feelings of those onboard.

The third part of the visit is the grand finale - the spectacular Overlord Embroidery and Legacy Gallery. The impressive 83-metre-long embroidery, longer than the Bayeux Tapestry, with 34 extraordinary hand stitched panels, was created to commemorate people who took part in D-Day. You can also hear the Veterans' personal stories as they reflect on their wartime service.

Henry VIII's Southsea Castle


Just south of The D-Day Story sits Southsea Castle, built in 1544 by Henry VIII to guard against enemy ships and reportedly from where he watched his favourite warship, the Mary Rose, sink at the Battle of the Solent.

The full castle visitor offer is available each year from April to October and includes the castle keep with an overview of its history, the ramparts with great views across the Solent to the Isle of Wight, the shop and delicious Courtyard café and restaurant.

The Courtyard stays open during the winter months for food and drink all year round. The on-site micro-brewery opens on occasional weekend days for off-sales.



There are more running events along the coast all year round,



If spirits are more your thing, perhaps a visit to the Portsmouth Distillery Co. should be on the cards.






